

ATOMIC ATTACK

BEFORE THE ATOM-BOMB BURST:

- ALL PERSONNEL, WHO ARE SO DIRECTED, TAKE COVER WITHIN THE SKIN OF THE SHIP.
- 2. IF YOUR DUTY STATION IS SUCH THAT YOU CANNOT TAKE COVER WITHIN THE SKIN OF THE SHIP, REMEMBER THE FOLLOWING:
 - (A) DO NOT LOOK DIRECTLY AT THE BOMB BURST.
 - (B) TAKE COVER BEHIND SOME STURDY PORTION OF THE SHIP.
 - (C) COVER ALL EXPOSED PORTIONS OF YOUR BODY.

AFTER THE ATOM-BOMB BURST:

- 3. REMAIN BEHIND COVER AT LEAST 90 SECONDS.
- 4. DO NOT ENTER ANY CONTAMINATED AREA THAT IS DESIGNATED BY THIS SIGN-OR INDICATED OTHERWISE.



- 5. DO NOT EAT, DRINK, OR SMOKE DURING AN ATOMIC ATTACK.
- 6. DECONTAMINATION STATIONS ARE PROVIDED FOR YOUR PROTECTION. IF YOU HAVE BEEN EXPOSED TO RADIO-ACTIVITY, YOU WILL BE DIRECTED TO PROCEED TO ONE OF THESE STATIONS FOR DECONTAMINATION.
